The following is helpful information regarding procedures to clear an absence, our tardy policy, students leaving campus, and school attire.

HOW TO CLEAR AN ABSENCE—Please phone Student Services any time to report your child's absence. When leaving a message, please state your child's name, your name, date of absence and reason. Or, upon returning to school, send your student with written documentation regarding the absence that is signed by a parent or guardian. When there is no verification within three school days, the absence is considered unexcused. If a student accrues three or more unexcused absences, the student is considered to be truant (Ed Code 48260). Parents and guardians may call the following numbers to clear a student's absence:

TARDY POLICY- Students must be in their seats when the bell rings. If a student is not in their seat, they will receive an unexcused tardy. A thirty minute detention will be assigned, and must be completed within five school days. Written verification by a medical office with date and time listed, will be an excused tardy.

LEAVING CAMPUS—If your student needs to leave campus during school hours, they will need to obtain an off campus pass **prior** to leaving campus. This can be arranged by either:

1. Sending your student with a note stating your student's first and last name, the reason, the time they need to leave campus, and your name. Your student will receive an off-campus pass which they will show the teacher when it is time to leave class. Your student can conveniently meet you in the parking lot.

2. Call the attendance office at 891-3050 and the corresponding extension listed above, and an off campus pass will be prepared for your student. It will be the student's responsibility to pick up the off campus pass during their passing period or lunch. They will show the pass to the teacher when it is time to leave class and meet you in the parking lot.

SCHOOL ATTIRE—Students need to dress appropriately for school and school related functions. Unacceptable clothing includes strapless tops, bare midriffs, bandeau tops with or without a sheer top, sheer clothing, underwear showing, sagging pants, gang affiliated and/or "illegal" or "inappropriate" displays on clothing. This includes, but is not limited to, Sierra Nevada logo clothing. Violations may result in Saturday School.

PLEASE PLAN AHEAD— Class time is valuable! Parents are always welcome to drop off an item for their student, as long as the student knows to pick it up. We do not deliver notes or items to classrooms, as it is a disruption to instructional time. Thank you.

SENIORS:

Financial Aid Night has moved!-

FAFSA is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid. This form determines a student's eligibility for state and federal financial aid programs and must be filed by parents and students. The application is completed online at <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u> Log on, obtain a PIN number, and begin your application any time after 10/1/17.

• **Students will be able to file a 2017–18 FAFSA as early as Oct. 1, 2017**. Students and parents will use income information from the 2016 tax year.

• **Cash for College/Financial Aid Night** is held on January 25th in the PVHS Library and will explain the federal financial aid process and assist you in understanding the application.

• **Required registration is at 5:30 and the program starts at 6:00 p.m.** Representatives from Butte College and Chico State Financial Aid Offices will be providing great information, answering questions and able to help you get on a computer and begin completing the FAFSA.

All college bound students who plan to apply for Financial Aid <u>must</u> fill out the FAFSA by 3/1/18.

Senior appointments for college application planning

Appointments are available in late September and October for seniors to meet with their counselor and plan their strategy for college applications. Parents are welcome to join the meeting. Counselors will be presenting information in senior English classes the last week of September to review this information. It is critical to meet with your Counselor if you plan to apply to private universities.

Students planning on attending any college should also make an appointment with their counselor to make sure they have any questions answered and are aware of deadlines, etc. Please come into the counseling office at lunch or after school to make the appointment through Mrs. Novak or Mrs. Howell.

College application time for seniors!:

<u>California State University</u> – The CSU application will be online starting in October. CSU applications may be submitted from October 1 until November 30. The CSU application does not require an essay or recommendation letter. Students must take the SAT Reasoning test or the ACT test to qualify for admission. The testing deadline is December, although some campuses have earlier deadlines. Make sure your student checks with university websites for further information. The CSU campuses are accessed through <u>https://www2.calstate.edu/apply.</u>

<u>University of California</u> – The UC application is available online and is submitted during the month of November with the deadline of November 30th. The application requires the student to write 4 Insight Questions, rather than a personal statement. The UC application does not require letters of recommendation. The SAT Reasoning test or ACT must be completed no later than December. SAT subject area exams may be recommended for some majors but are no longer required for general admission. UC campus information is accessed through <u>universityofcalifornia.edu/admissions</u>

Private College/University Applications

Students will find the applications and application deadlines online at the university website. Please give teachers and counselors at least a <u>three-week</u> advance notice if you need a letter of recommendation for private college applications. Make a college planning appointment with your counselor to set up your application and recommendation timelines.

Butte College – PVHS Seniors who will be starting their higher education at Butte College will need to participate in the **Reg-to-Go** early registration program. The Reg-to-Go program is offered during the spring semester for early priority registration to Butte College for certificate programs and transfer programs. Butte College Admissions Office will be presenting information to seniors in Econ/Government classes in December or January. Watch the PV website for further information.

<u>Senior Profile /Scholarships</u> – This is the time of year for seniors to complete their Senior Profiles! Find the template for Senior Profile under the Counseling tab on the home page. Please complete this form, or create one of your own with similar information, and submit it to the Counseling office. Students who complete the Senior Profile will be considered for scholarship nominations for scholarships that come through the Counseling office. In addition, watch the home page for the Scholarship Bulletin. Any senior who qualifies may apply for these scholarships.

Underclassman:

College Testing (ACT AND SAT)

Juniors who are planning to attend a university should register to take the ACT, SAT Reasoning and SAT subject area exams (if applicable) starting this spring. Current seniors have the opportunity to re-test until December. Please check the website of the universities where you will apply to make sure they do not require completion of tests sooner; some are as early as October. Find test registration information and test dates at **collegeboard.com** & **act.org**.

New changes with identification requirements for the ACT and SAT testing have been implemented and they are very strict. Students MUST bring their admission ticket (with their picture ID) to the test site the day they test or they will not be admitted to the test. In addition, they must upload a picture when registering for the test and must also bring a government issued or school picture ID to be admitted to the test site. If your student does not have the appropriate picture ID, they are not allowed to take the test and are turned away.

PSAT/NMSQT

The **PSAT/NMSQT** is for **JUNIORS ONLY** this year. CUSD will be providing the **PSAT 10** for all sophomores in the spring (test window is Feb 26 to Apr 27 – exact date TBD). Mrs. Holen is the coordinator for the PSAT 10.

WHEN is the PSAT/NMSQT? Saturday, October 14th, from 8 am to approximately 12:00. Students should arrive no later than 7:45am for check-in.

WHERE is the PSAT/NMSQT held? At Pleasant Valley High School

HOW MUCH does the PSAT cost? \$20-- Checks or money orders can be made payable to CUSD. No cash will be accepted. <u>Fee waivers are available for qualifying juniors only</u> (students will need to see Debbie or Terese in the Counseling Office for a fee waiver.)

WHAT is the PAYMENT PERIOD for the PSAT? Monday, Sept 18th through Monday, October 9th. Students should sign-up early! We have space for 175 testers, and sign-ups are on a first come, first served basis.

HOW do you SIGN UP for the PSAT?

Detailed instructions for PSAT sign-ups can be found on the PVHS website. Look under the Counseling tab for the PSAT Link.

- Students <u>MUST</u> obtain a **PSAT payment form** either in the Counseling Office or on the PVHS website (counseling link). They will attach the payment form to their check or money order.
- Payments are accepted in the PSAT drop-box located in the Counseling Office.
- When students drop off their payment, they should pickup a PSAT study guide.

Educational Talent Search and Upward Bound:

Students with aspirations of attending a four year college right after high school may be interested in learning about Educational Talent Search and Upward Bound program:

<u>Educational Talent Search</u>: As part of the Trio program at CSU Chico, ETS is committed to academically prepare and motivate low-income, first generation college students for success in postsecondary education. ETS advisors from Chico State make monthly contact with qualified students and present workshops according to grade level on topics such as career awareness, college requirements & study skills, ACT/SAT preparation, scholarships, and financial aid. In addition, advisors take seniors step-by-step through the college application, financial aid, and education support programs (EOP) process.

For more information on how ETS might work for you visit the counseling office and speak with your counselor and pick up an application. ETS recruiters will be on campus in early October.

Upward Bound is geared toward students with academic potential, first generation college student, ESL Learners, and are interested in pursuing a college education. Those wishing to pursue a college education in the fields of Math, Science, Engineering, or technology are encouraged to apply. CSU, Chico Trio programs provide tutoring, mentoring, summer programs, and assistance with college applications and college success skills. Certain eligibility criteria apply. Applications are available in the counseling office.

Peer Tutoring:

If your student is struggling in any classes, their teacher is generally the best resource for assistance. Most teachers are available at lunch or after school to assist students with their academic needs. PVHS also has a Peer Tutoring program that is run through the Counseling Office. We have a number of peer tutors who have signed up to assist students who need extra help in an academic class. Students can come into the Counseling Office for more information. Peer tutoring will be available Monday-Friday for students to drop in or by teacher referral. Tutoring will also be available at lunch, Tuesday-Thursday by appointment only. Students can make an appointment in the counseling office if they would like to meet at lunch.

Counseling available!

To assist our students in need of ongoing personal counseling and wellness, we have four CSU Chico Masters Student Interns who are available for our students. These students are fully supervised, both on our campus and through their supervision at Chico State. They are available to see students weekly for ongoing personal counseling and wellness.

News from College Connection



Class of 2019 Juniors and Parents,

College Connection is a partnership between Butte College and CUSD designed to help motivated high school students grow and thrive in a college setting. This partnership allows the students to enroll in 6 Butte College classes (approximately 3 classes each semester) tuition free during the senior year. College Connection students pay approximately \$40 per term (Butte College fees), while a high school graduate enrolled at Butte College pays approximately \$100 for fees and \$46 per unit tuition each term.

College Connection is taught and supervised by CUSD credentialed teachers; the students complete their graduation requirements through a combination of daily class time and independent study work. The College Connection teacher advises students on college course selections, time management, study skills, and facilitates student involvement in academic and campus life activities. The program serves as a bridge from high school to college—two very different academic environments.

This program is designed for a variety of students. The traits common to College Connection students are: maturity, motivation, and readiness to step outside of their comfort zones. Some College Connection students have clear post high school plans and some are in the process of determining post high school plans, some students will go directly to four year universities while others will remain at Butte College to complete general education or Associates degrees, while some may choose to enlist in the armed forces. Students will have the opportunity to take courses in an intended major and to explore fields of study and move towards selecting a major. Some College Connection students maintain close ties to their high school community (athletic teams, clubs, and school events) while other students welcome the opportunity to be in a new school community without the drama or distractions common to high school.

If you are ready to move beyond your high school and into a supported college environment in your senior year, if you are curious, if you want to develop your independence pick up a College Connection application at the counseling office in December, talk to your high school counselor, contact a program advisor, and speak to College Connection students and alumni.

Each one depicts scenes from *Tom Sawyer, Romeo and Juliet, and A Christmas Carol.* We are so pleased with our literary themed artwork!






Work Permits


Visual Arts:


News from International Day of Peace


