# The following is helpful information regarding procedures to clear an absence, our tardy policy, students leaving campus, and school attire.

**HOW TO CLEAR AN ABSENCE**—Please phone Student Services any time to report your child's absence. When leaving a message, please state your child's name, your name, date of absence and reason. Or, upon returning to school, send your student with written documentation regarding the absence that is signed by a parent or guardian. When there is no verification within three school days, the absence is considered unexcused. If a student accrues three or more unexcused absences, the student is considered to be truant (Ed Code 48260). Parents and guardians may call the following numbers to clear a student's absence:

**TARDY POLICY-** Students must be in their seats when the bell rings. If a student is not in their seat, they will receive an unexcused tardy. A thirty minute detention will be assigned, and must be completed within five school days. Written verification by a medical office with date and time listed, will be an excused tardy.

**LEAVING CAMPUS**—If your student needs to leave campus during school hours, they will need to obtain an off campus pass **prior** to leaving campus. This can be arranged by either:

1. Sending your student with a note stating your student's first and last name, the reason, the time they need to leave campus, and your name. Your student will receive an off-campus pass which they will show the teacher when it is time to leave class. Your student can conveniently meet you in the parking lot.

2. Call the attendance office at 891-3050 and the corresponding extension listed above, and an off campus pass will be prepared for your student. It will be the student's responsibility to pick up the off campus pass during their passing period or lunch. They will show the pass to the teacher when it is time to leave class and meet you in the parking lot.

**SCHOOL ATTIRE**—Students need to dress appropriately for school and school related functions. Unacceptable clothing includes strapless tops, bare midriffs, bandeau tops with or without a sheer top, sheer clothing, underwear showing, sagging pants, gang affiliated and/or "illegal" or "inappropriate" displays on clothing. This includes, but is not limited to, Sierra Nevada logo clothing. Violations may result in Saturday School.

**PLEASE PLAN AHEAD**— Class time is valuable! Parents are always welcome to drop off an item for their student, as long as the student knows to pick it up. We do not deliver notes or items to classrooms, as it is a disruption to instructional time. Thank you.

# Seniors (Class of 2018):

# **Butte College Promise Scholarship Program**

Exciting news for seniors! Butte College President Samia Yaqub has announced Butte College will offer a new program that provides free tuition and fees for students beginning in Fall 2018. The Butte College Promise Scholarship Program will offer two semesters of free tuition and fees for first-time, full-time college students. To be eligible for the program, students would be first time college students, apply for financial aid, maintain a GPA of 2.0 or higher, and take 12 units or more. Make sure your student has completed the FAFSA to be eligible for this great program!

# FINANCIAL AID/FAFSA DEADLINE

REMEMBER- All college bound seniors that are applying for Financial Aid must submit the FAFSA by 3/2/18. This form determines a student's eligibility for state and federal financial aid programs and must be completed by parents and students online at <a href="https://fafsa.ed.gov">https://fafsa.ed.gov</a>. Remember, if you get on a website that charges a fee, you are on the wrong website. Filing your FAFSA is free! You must fill out a FAFSA to be eligible for the Butte College Promise Scholarship.

**Scholarship Bulletin**: Remember to watch the Scholarship Bulletin weekly for any scholarship opportunities. Mrs. Novak in the Counseling Office does a wonderful job posting information on incoming scholarships and deadlines. The Scholarship Bulletin is updated weekly! It is easily accessed on the Pleasant Valley High School Counseling office link on the PV webpage.

# **Advanced Placement Registration Information:**

Payments are currently being accepted through March 27<sup>th</sup> for this year's AP exams in May. The price is \$94 per exam or \$15 per exam for those students who qualify for a fee waiver.

Registration information and fee waiver applications are available in the Counseling Office. Payments can be made with check or money order (no cash) payable to CUSD. An alternate payment schedule can be arranged if initiated before the March 27<sup>th</sup> deadline by paying a non-refundable \$25 deposit for each test you wish to purchase. The remaining balance of \$69 per exam must be paid by April 27<sup>th</sup>.

# Butte College Bound Seniors (Reg2Go)

The Butte College Reg2Go program began in January when Butte College Counselors visited Econ and Government classes to provide information to students about the Reg2Go program and other relevant information pertaining to enrollment. Reg2Go is as excellent opportunity for high school seniors to participate in orientation, assessment, counseling, and gain early registration before classes fill up. This all takes place before the end of their senior year.

If your senior is planning on attending Butte College in the fall, this program gives them priority registration and takes them through all the steps necessary to be ready for Butte College enrollment in the fall.

Seniors and families, please plan to stay for the full evening of presentations so that we can fully celebrate each senior who is being recognized. Recipients should wear dressy attire as a show of respect for the honor. Let's celebrate the accomplishments of these outstanding seniors!

# JUNIORS (Class of 2019):

### University-bound Juniors—College Admission Testing

<u>SAT and ACT Exams</u>: Junior students who hope to attend a four-year university upon graduation need to register now for the college entrance exams. The CSU and UC system, and major universities will require either the SAT or the ACT test. Register online at <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> and <u>www.act.org</u>. Contact your counselor for clarification or further information. Remember, we recommend that students take their SAT or ACT test beginning in spring of their junior year. The last date recommended to take an SAT or ACT test is October of the senior year, although some schools will accept a test taken in December.

**Juniors:** Remember to work on your Senior Profile now so that you are prepared for the college application process and scholarship applications for your senior year.

# Sophomores (Class of 2020)

**PSAT 10**: All 10<sup>th</sup> grade students will take the PSAT during the school day April 10th. The PSAT 10 is a practice test for the SAT test. No fee is required. The PSAT 10 provides a score report that can be uses to see areas of strength and weakness and will help identify any AP classes your student may be prepared to take.

**All grade levels**: As you plan your summer, think about completing community service activities or volunteer work. Get involved in something that you are passionate about, explore a career, job shadow someone in a career of interest! There are many great volunteer opportunities in Chico. Spend your summer exploring a career or providing volunteer work. There is information on the PVHS Website regarding volunteer opportunities (under the Counseling tab) or you can see Mrs. Keller in the Career Center.

**Enloe Medical Center Junior Volunteer Program:** Is your student interested in becoming an Enloe Medical Center Junior Volunteer? Enloe Medical Center's Junior Volunteer Program is open to high school students ages 15-18. This program accepts applications only once per year. # **Class changes for next school year:**

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** To have priority choices please finalize requests and make all adjustments by March 10th.

When school starts in August – <u>ONLY</u> the following changes will be considered and may not be possible due to impacted classes:

- 1) A "D" or "F" grade from spring semester indicates the student should repeat a course
- 2) There is a documented medical reason for a class period change
- 3) Teacher recommends a level change
- 4) Student is academically over-programmed and needs to adjust the academic load
- 5) Student has spent one full school year with a teacher and prefers to take a course with a different teacher
- 6) Student needs to enroll in Work Experience

## SINCE WE PLAN THE SCHEDULE BASED ON CLASS SIGN-UPS, NO ELECTIVE CHANGES WILL BE MADE.

### SUMMER SCHOOL:

**Chico Unified School District** Summer Credit Recovery is scheduled to be held at Fair View High School between 6/18/18 and 7/13/18. Summer school registration forms are available at the Pleasant Valley High School Counseling Office. Summer school is a credit recovery program for students who have failed a class and need to make up credits. You are encouraged to register your student immediately as summer classes fill up quickly and classes are enrolled on a first come/first serve basis.

If your student has failed more than **ONE** class while in high school, they will not be on track for graduation without summer credit recovery classes or additional intervention and coursework. To insure your student will graduate, they must attend summer credit recovery to make up their credit deficiency.

# Grades Always Count!

**Spring Semester 2018** grades and credits will affect **fall and winter** eligibility. Including incoming 9<sup>th</sup> graders from the junior high schools. This is a reminder to all students and parents that eligibility next year is affected by their spring grades. <u>Students must have a minimum 2.0 GPA to be academically cleared and at least a 1.50 GPA to use academic probation, with the required credits.</u> Academic Probation may only be used one time in all of high school. Additionally, students will need the following number of credits to be eligible in the fall, 2018.

**We encourage** <u>all</u> athletes to attend Physical Night. With a \$10.00 donation, this is the easiest and least expensive way to get your physical and all your paperwork turned in to be cleared for athletics for the next school year. The doctors of the Butte-Glenn Medical Society generously donate their time for sports physicals for all CUSD athletes, incoming 9<sup>th</sup> graders through 12<sup>th</sup> grade. Having a yearly physical is a <u>state requirement for participation in school athletics</u>, and must be complete before you can begin practice

Please pick up the required Physical Form in the Main Office or Athletic Director's Office 01-B. The form is also available on-line at our website, **http://pvhs.chicousd.org**. The 1<sup>st</sup> page of the physical form must be completed and signed by both the athlete and a parent.

Medical Insurance is required to participate in athletics. If you do not have medical school insurance it can be purchased at <u>www.studentinsuranceusa.com</u>. Please bring a copy of proof/copy of your coverage to the Athletic Director's office.
