Which language should you study?

Success in a second language depends primarily on your motivation and hard work. All classes have some homework and require studying outside of class.

More than likely, you will study this language for two to four years, so think about why you would like to learn a language when deciding which language to study.

- What are your interests in and out of school?
- Do you plan to travel overseas for business or recreation?

Most students begin with Level I when they enter high school.

However, if you have had significant previous experience with the language you wish to take, you may take a placement examination, which may place you in a level II, III or IV class, depending on your abilities and experience.

- has a positive effect on intellectual growth and enriches and enhances a child's mental development.
- leaves students with more flexibility in thinking, greater sensitivity to language, and a better ear for listening.

- gives a child the ability to communicate with people s/he would otherwise not have the chance to know.
- opens the door to other cultures and helps a child understand and appreciate people from other countries.
- gives a student a head start in language requirements for college.
- increases job opportunities in many careers where knowing another language is a real asset.
